

Action Fraud Alert: Money Mules

Money mule recruiters are targeting those looking for work or to earn easy money by posting fake adverts on jobs websites and social media. Criminals may ask them to receive money into their bank account and transfer it to another account, keeping some of the cash for themselves. If they let this happen, they are a money mule and are involved in money laundering, which is a crime.

Ticket Fraud

As a result of the high demand for tickets, the National Fraud Intelligence Bureau (NFIB) are warning buyers to take extra care when buying tickets online. Action Fraud are urging people to be wary of fraudsters selling fake or non-existent tickets to events.

CLASSIFICATION - SUITABLE FOR PUBLICATION

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Spot the signs of ticket fraud and protect yourself:

-  Only buy tickets from the venue's box office, official promoter or agent, or a well-known and reputable ticket site.
-  Avoid paying for tickets by bank transfer, especially if buying from someone unknown. Credit card or payment services such as PayPal offer greater protection against fraud.
-  Be wary of unsolicited emails, texts or adverts offering unbelievably good deals on tickets. If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is.
-  Is the vendor a member of STAR? If they are, the company has signed up to their strict governing standards. STAR also offers an approved Alternative Dispute Resolution service to help customers with outstanding complaints. For more information: www.star.org.uk/buy_safe

There have been reports to Ofcom of people receiving text messages claiming to be from Royal Mail, asking for payment to deliver a parcel. **This is a scam.** If you receive a text like this **do not tap on the link.** Instead, forward the text to **7726** to report it to your provider.
